PENNSYLVANIA NETWORK FOR STUDENT ASSISTANCE SERVICES INTERAGENCY UPDATE

PA Department of Education:

The PA Department of Education, Safe Schools Office, anticipates offering no-cost K-12 Student Assistance Program (SAP) training for LEAs this school year. The funds are currently still pending based on finalization of the state budget. As you know, SAP is a mandated K-12 program in Pennsylvania as per Chapter 12, 12.42 of the PA School Code and Act 211 of 1990 (24 P.S. 12.12.42-1547). Correspondence was sent to LEAs regarding this training opportunity.

The trainings need to be completed by June 8, 2016. Substitute costs, meals, travel, etc. will not be funded. PDE will direct all training monies to the respective Commonwealth Approved Trainers (CAT's) and not to the individual districts. Act 48 credits will be available for the K-12 SAP training.

This year, K-12 SAP Team training for up to 4 new SAP team members will be available for districts with enrollment under 10,000. Since SAP is mandatory K-12, priority will be given to those districts interested in starting new Elementary Student Assistance Teams. Although every effort will be made to satisfy all districts' training requests, it will be based on availability of funds and/or each CAT's training schedule. New Elementary Student Assistance team requests will be our first priority.

Contact your [SAP Regional Coordinator](#) for a copy of the PDE Funded K-12 SAP Training Request Form. The Request Form should be electronically submitted to your SAP Regional Coordinator no later than 4:00 p.m. November 16, 2015. Only one request form per district will be accepted. Your Regional Coordinator will contact your district to let them know the status of the funding request.

SAP BACK TO BASICS

Statewide Resources for SAP Teams

Our SAP county coordination team is looking for a speaker on. . . We're having a lot of referrals about . . . Where can we get more information on this issue? What's a good program for . . .? Questions! Questions! Questions! But where do you find the answers? Student Assistance teams need to be aware of what's out there to assist them in their work with students. There are many statewide resources that are worth checking out. Here are a few to get you started.

- **Pennsylvania Network for Student Assistance Services (PNSAS)**

The mission of the Pennsylvania Network for Student Assistance Services is to provide leadership for developing a safe and drug-free environment and mental health wellness in schools and communities across the Commonwealth. Barriers to learning will be removed and student academic achievement will be enhanced through collaborative prevention, intervention, and post-intervention services.

On the network's new website at <http://pnsas.org/Home> you can find many resources that your SAP team can use including: a downloadable SAP parent brochure that you can customize for your school's program; a checklist to complete to see if your SAP team is operating with fidelity (how closely your team is following the Pennsylvania approved model for SAP teams); a list of Commonwealth Approved SAP trainers across the state; and SAP satisfaction surveys that you can distribute to your students, staff, and parents. You can also find links to recent webinars produced by the network. The website also lists the contact information for your SAP regional coordinator who is available to provide technical assistance to your SAP team. - **Office for Safe Schools**

Office for Safe Schools coordinates school safety and security programs, collection of the annual school violence statistics, coordination of anti-violence efforts, and development of policies and strategies to combat school violence. It supports and provides technical assistance and professional development programs in the following areas and security-related activities to support school safety: crisis intervention, school police training, violence prevention, and social/emotional wellness and safety provides services to all local school entities.

The Office for Safe Schools sponsors the PA Bullying Prevention Consultation Hotline which is a toll-free number that allows individuals experiencing chronic and unresolved bullying to discuss effective strategies and available resources to deal with school-based bullying. This supportive resource has been developed in collaboration with the Center for Health Promotion and Disease Prevention (CHPDP), and is available, at no cost, to students, parents/guardians and school districts across the state of Pennsylvania.

- **Pennsylvania Association of Student Assistance Professionals (PASAP)**

PASAP is the professional organization for Student Assistance Program (SAP) teams and related support agencies in Pennsylvania. According to Lisa Sviben Miller, the President of PASAP, "The organization's board of directors is comprised of educational professionals and community-based program specialists with a core mission to support schools and agencies in meeting the needs of Pennsylvania youth in the areas of education, prevention, intervention, referral, and support services. Our purpose also is to encourage the advancement and improvement of practices and services as a means to remove barriers to learning and promote success/achievement in school and in life."

According to Ms. Miller, PASAP, which has been in existence since 1990, is a membership-driven association that produces an annual conference, numerous regional workshops, webinars and other related professional development activities. She states that “In addition, PASAP provides a forum for sharing resources, common needs, experiences and outcomes in an effort to enhance the services provided to the youth in our Commonwealth.” To learn more visit the PASAP website at <http://www.pasap.org/>.

- **STAR Center**

STAR-Center Outreach is available to provide training to school districts and agencies throughout the Commonwealth on an array of topics as they relate to students at risk. These services are provided at no cost because of the generous support STAR-Center receives from the PA General Assembly. Here is a sampling of topics that Star-Center Outreach has presented on in the past:

- Beyond the Blues: A Look at Depression and Anxiety in Our Youth.
- Bullying Prevention and Intervention: Creating Safe and Caring Schools.
- Crisis Management and Postvention Training for Schools.
- Redirecting Bullying Behavior, Engaging Targets and Empowering On-lookers: What Caring Adults Need to Know

In addition to their education and outreach, the STAR Center also provides postvention and crisis response services. According to their website “When a suicide or tragedy occurs in a school district, our outreach staff consults with educators on how to provide postvention services. As always, our staff continues to be available by telephone to any district or agency 24/7 at 412-864-3346. Many school districts across the country have come to rely on our Postvention Standards Manual: A Guide for a School’s Response in the Aftermath of a Sudden Death. STAR-Center Outreach staff is available to consult with educators regarding how to provide postvention services following a suicide or tragedy that occurs in their school community.” Learn more at <http://www.starcenter.pitt.edu/>

- **Center for Safe Schools**

On their website, the Center for Safe Schools states that the Center “in partnership with the Pennsylvania Department of Education supports schools, local agencies and parents in developing and practicing emergency management and crisis response plans; creating positive school environments; implementing evidence-based programs; and institutionalizing proactive safety measures in partnership with law enforcement and other community entities to address local needs. Through expert staff, as well as access to a network of state and national researchers and practitioners, the Center provides state-of-the-art professional development, technical assistance and resources to schools throughout the Commonwealth.”

The Center has several initiatives including: Bullying Prevention, Emergency Management, Internet Safety and Mission Homefront. In addition, the Center sponsors a free “Third Thursday Bullying Prevention” webinar series each month from 3:00 PM – 4:15 PM. They also host the “Safe Schools Conference” each year which is focused on the latest research in how to create a positive school culture that supports academic success and provides a safe teaching and learning environment. According to the conference’s description, “This conference is designed to provide quality professional development opportunities for school administrators, student support personnel, teachers, school nurses, SAP team members, school resource officers, local law enforcement and other community partners.” To learn more about the services go to <http://www.safeschools.info/>.

- **The Pennsylvania Office of Attorney General**

The Pennsylvania Office of Attorney General’s Education and Outreach Unit offers a number of free educational programs to help school personnel, students, parents and the community empower children with knowledge to keep them safe and to make good decisions. According to their website: “Our Education and Outreach staff provides presentations throughout the state of Pennsylvania on topics ranging from drug awareness, cyber safety, and cyber bullying. These unique programs feature, interactive learning along with a powerful message. All the presentations are updated to remain consistent with the rapid changes of our society. The Education and Outreach Unit programs are also able to be tailored to the needs of your audience; given the content as it relates to the jurisdiction of the Office of

Attorney General. All of the above topics can also be presented to parents to educate them on how to better protect their children.”

The Evidence-based Prevention and Intervention Support Center (EPISCenter) represents a collaborative partnership between the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency (PCCD), the Bennett Pierce Prevention Research Center, the College of Health and Human Development, Penn State University, with funding and support from the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency (PCCD) and the Pennsylvania Department of Human Services (DHS).

The EPISCenter website states that “the EPISCenter aims to promote the greater use of prevention and intervention programs that have proven their effectiveness in rigorous scientific evaluations. The Center’s primary goal is to advance high quality implementation, impact assessment, and sustainability of these evidence-based programs to maximize the positive impact of prevention science on outcomes for youth, families, and communities.”
